A Trip to the Principal's Office

Greetings from DMS/DHS. We are off to a great start! Enrollment at the end of last year was up for the first time in years, and since the start of this school year, we've enrolled an additional 30 students. We believe that because we are offering a better learning environment, students who previously chose other schools are coming back. We are excited about so many things this year. Like most of the universities within the USA, Dayton High School now offers online classes for its students. There has been some concern expressed regarding these classes, but most concerns are simply misunderstandings. Please allow me to explain why we are offering online classes and how they help our students prepare for future success.

Our Online classes are offered for several reasons. The first of which is obvious and falls in line with what many other high schools do; credit recovery. Credit recovery is needed when a student has failed prior classes and is off track for graduating on time, or is at risk of dropping out. The rigorous online courses, allow a second chance opportunity to those students. The second reason for offering online classes is to provide a larger selection of elective courses for our student body to choose from.

When a student enters Dayton High School, he or she takes 7 classes per day over a period of 4 years. That totals to a possibility of 28 credits by graduation. DHS requires 25 credits to graduate and within that 25, there are specific requirements. For instance, students must earn 4 high school math credits including Algebra I, Geometry, and Algebra II. 4 years of English are also required, three years of science and social studies, etc. The list goes on and on. We have a total of 26 teachers that are shared between the middle and high schools. We do everything we can to provide a wide variety of class choices with the staff available.

However, we have many students that do very well academically, and by their senior year need only one or two actual classes for graduation. These students are still required to take 7 classes per day and will earn additional credits. Currently DHS does not offer Pre-Calculus classes due to the lack of students prepared for such coursework. Through the use of our online programs, students can take Pre-Calculus, and a wide variety of other courses. The great thing is that students now have choices that they did not have before. Students can pick elective classes that they are interested in. Another reason for offering online courses is college preparation. Many of you already know that colleges now require students to take some online coursework. By exposing students to this type of coursework while in high school, they have a unique opportunity to prepare for what they will likely face in college. We owe it to our students to provide them this opportunity.

A final reason for offering these online courses is, scheduling flexibility. We have a few students that have unique scheduling needs. For instance, those students that attend vocational school. We are grateful for the opportunity to offer students vocational studies. For those students, it serves as an opportunity for success and future employment. Those students travel outside of DHS for up to 4 hours per day, which gives us limitations when it comes to our required classes. With online courses, we are able to allow more students to attend vocational studies if they choose that career pathway. With DHS offering more career pathways, now than in the past, students may be experimenting to see what best fits them. This too can cause a scheduling issue; given our limited staff. In this situation online classes provide flexibility so that we can allow these students to explore while still servicing their high school graduation requirements.

One final note for our readers regarding online classes: Please know that we are not forcing any students to take these classes. We use them as more of an opportunity for improvement and increased student choice. DMS/DHS will continue to strive for greatness. We will explore every opportunity to become better at educating our students and preparing them for future success. They deserve choices and opportunities.

We tell our students every day that they can accomplish anything if they use two things that they all possess...their minds and their hearts. We can see the desire and passion in their eyes when we talk about accomplishing our goal – being labelled as a Proficient School. It was only .6 points that kept us from achieving our vision last year when the K-PREP scores were released. We are eagerly awaiting the release of our new state test scores from this past May in hopes of hanging our banner of proficiency on the front of the school. Someone once said, "It is just good to be in the hunt." Well, we are right there and knocking on the door of proficiency – a school ranked in the top 30% of the state.

We also understand at LES that is just isn't about data. We must also continue to build relationships with our students, parents, and others in the community. We are proud to say that we hold class meetings with our students where we talk about expectations for the year. We also have parents read and sign the student code of conduct that is located in our student agenda books. We also pleased to announce that we have many new One to One Reading coaches who are signed up to work with our youth this year as we focus on increasing fluency and comprehension. Thank you to the city of Dayton employees and other community members who rose to the challenge of volunteering in our building once a week with our young readers. We will continue to build relationships with all stakeholders always realizing that you can never have too many individuals who can make the difference in the lives of our precious children.

We certainly believe that rewarding students for making good choices on a daily basis is imperative to academic and personal success. This will be the fourth year in a row where students can earn a "Devil Dollar" for staying on a green (good status). Students will then earn the privilege of redeeming their Devil Dollars at the Devil Store. Students will get their first experience at the Devil Store during the month of September. Once again, the 6th graders will run the show by escorting students to the store and serving as cashiers. We will continue to challenge our 6th graders to be leaders in the building while serving as an example that the young ones can look up to for guidance. Please remember that we are always looking for donations to the Devil Store so we can continue to utilize positive reinforcement with our students.

We are also looking for guidance from the LES parents and teachers as we strive to build a much stronger PTC organization. The Parent Teacher Committee serves as a great opportunity for everyone to get involved with the numerous fundraisers and school functions taking place this year. The PTC meetings are typically held on the 4th Monday of the month and begin at 4:00pm or 6:00pm in Lincoln's library depending on what month it is. We encourage everyone to attend and become an active member in the great things taking place at LES. Please look in the next edition of the LES Newsletter regarding our next PTC meeting and like us on Facebook to receive updates about future events.

Finally, another initiative that will continue to occur this year will be the use of a school-wide communication folder. Every student in grades K-6 should be bringing home a green folder each Monday that includes graded papers and pertinent information to LES. Please be expecting these folders every Monday and take the time to go through them each week. As always, please don't hesitate to contact us at 292-7492 if you have any questions. We are very excited about the current momentum that we have at Lincoln Elementary School and know that if we "Expect More...and Demand More...then we will Achieve More!"


-Sweet Action Kids start a new year of activities, September 7-




Sleep and School-aged Children (5-12 years)







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Preventing dog bites and attacks

This article is NOT breed specific. With all of the recent bites, attacks, maulings and the occasional fatality involving dog bites, I feel this is important information to help make dog owners more aware.

Dogs are pack animals. If you own more than one dog, then you already have a pack. If you only have one dog, then your human family is the dog's pack. A single dog is more likely to become aggressive and protective over humans in the pack and territory. Multiple dogs can become aggressive just because their excited and they feed of each others energy. Humans do the same thing. That is how riots happen.

Children are more likely to be harmed by dogs. The child could be seen as an intruder to the "pack". The child could be seen as prey, especially if the child is loud, screaming, crying or running. The child could be seen as a lower member of the pack and the dog needs to "reprimand" or "teach" a lesson.

A child can be killed just as easily by a single dog as it can by a pack. Leash laws are so important because they keeps dogs home and under control. If your sweet family dog meets up with another dog while loose, they just formed a pack. If that other dog begins chasing and biting people, your dog will do it too. And your dog may like it and feel motivated to be "bigger and badder" by turning it up a notch.

All dogs can bite. I do hate hearing the phrase "my dog would never bite. My dog loves kids. My dog would never kill a cat, he lives with cats." Your dog is a dog. No matter what breed he was a wolf descendent, a predator, a pack animal and has teeth. Just because we do not understand why or how, just always know your dog can justify it in his doggie mind and will do things that you did not expect. We all can not have Cezar Milan save our dogs, but we all can do simple things to ensure we are pack leaders:

- Spay/neuter your dog. Remove biological and hormonal reasons for aggression. Mating times and/or mother dogs with pups cause attacks on both strangers and family members.
- Confine your dog. Allowing your dog to wander expands the dog's' territory
 that it must protect. Also you can't control the dog if it chooses to protect
 the sidewalk in front of your house, when the next jogger comes by. Keeping
 control of your dog puts you in the driver's seat and the he will respect you.
- Do not allow or force people that are nervous about your dog/dogs to interact with them. Especially do not leave them in charge of the dogs or alone with the dogs. Dogs know when they are in charge of a situation or not. Even the calmest sweetest dog can get an ego boost by snapping at someone or bullying someone. I hear "he's never did that to anyone before" often. Different people get a different reaction from the same dog. Most dogs hate your mailman. Two reasons: he is nervous about dogs and he comes often and the dog barks and "makes him leave", in that doggie mind. It's another ego boost thing. They think they saved the family from that "evil" mailman again.
- This may be hard for some people, but DO NOT TREAT YOUR DOG LIKE A HUMAN! If your dog has the size and strength to harm someone you need to be in control. Teach basic commands, Sit, Stay, Come, Down, Leave it, release. If your dog is showing aggressive tendencies, do not let him on the furniture. You need to send a clear message that you are alpha and he is not an equal. Crate training is wonderful. This helps you with housebreaking, preventing chewing and you control the dog and he will learn self control. The crate is also a great place to put the dog if a nervous visitor comes over or if children come over. This gives your dog a safe place.
- Know your dog and do not be in denial. Know if your dog is a resource guarder or not. If you have a large powerful dog and it gets aggressive over toys, food or space, you have a dangerous dog. I do not recommend children living in the same home. It only takes one snap to require plastic surgery or worse. Most of us have had a small dog with this problem. A small dog with this issue is not likely to kill or maim someone. If you are an alpha pack leader then remember to keep the kids safe. I do not give foster dogs toys, treats or food near my kids. They are given in their crate. That way, they have it at their leisure and do not have to "fight" for it.
- Never leave kids alone with a dog, EVER! Kids running in grass and being loud sounds like prey. You may trigger an attack. Kids that run are caught with teeth. Dogs may feel protective of your kids, but feel outside kids are a threat and attack. If your dog perceives you as hurting the kids, he may bite you too. Pay close attention if you are horsing around and the kids start yelling. Stop any protective behavior. You do not want the dog taking over.

I really hope this helps you recognize the potential your dog has and prevents someone from getting hurt. If you have any question or concerns please call 859.292.3622

I told you all to be ready for some hot days of summer and as of this writing it was about 91 degrees out, with probably 110% humidity. As we are going into Labor Day Weekend, I hope everyone gets the chance to enjoy one more summer weekend, even though I am sure there will be a few more hot days before we are through. With that thought in mind be sure to finish your summer fun days on a safe note.

- Use caution when firing up that old grill or propane barbeque grill to prepare your feast.
- I'm sure the grass will need cutting a few times before fall, so I hope you are storing your fuel in safe approved containers and in the shed outdoors.
- For all you joggers, walkers and runners out there make sure you are drinking lots of water and staying hydrated.

October is right around the corner and with that comes Fire Prevention Month and our theme this year from The National Fire Protection Association is "WORKING SMOKE ALARMS SAVE LIVES" which encourages you to test yours every month. Fireman Joe will be visiting the schools all month talking to the children about how important smoke alarms are, so be ready to act when they bring their safety message home. Did you know that many people don't test their smoke alarms as often as they should? When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. You need working smoke alarms to give you time to get out. Be sure to test yours every month. The 1st of the month is a good time to do so.

Now I want to make a couple of quick points,. Make sure your smoke alarms have the label of a recognized testing laboratory. An ionization smoke alarm is more responsive to flaming fires, and a photoelectric smoke alarm is more responsive to smoldering fires. Both types of alarms or combination (photoelectric/ionization) alarms should be installed in the home. Smoke alarms and alert devices, called accessories, are available for people who are deaf or hard of hearing. Go to nfpa.org/safetytips to find out more.

To be honest with you, I just want everyone to have a working smoke alarm in your home; along with a good exit plan that leads everyone with a safe meeting place. Knowing what to do when the alarm goes off is just as important as having it in the home. We have a few alarms available at the firehouse with batteries, in case you can't afford one.
