After an amazing run dating back 75 years, George Christofield has locked his restaurant door for the last time on February 23rd, 2014. George's parents Peter and Christine, who were Greek and spoke very little English, came to Dayton in 1939 with only \$27 in their pockets and opened the restaurant. They passed it on to George when he returned home after a stint in the Marine Corps.

On July 15, 2009, George was presented a proclamation from the city to honor the legacy of his parents, marking 70 years of business longevity. But after being renamed Christofield's Family Restaurant, the people from Dayton and surrounding areas, simply out of habit, continued to refer to it the Dayton Chili Parlor. It was a place where all of us would meet before or after work, games, church or school---sort of like a sober episode of Cheers, where everybody knows your name. It was a place where you could almost feel the pulse of the city, with a little bit of gossip mixed in with some cold hard facts.







Here are some water safety tips:

CEO (Constant Eyes-On) Supervision - Never turn your back on your child around water. It takes just seconds for him/her to be in serious trouble. Assign supervision responsibilities so there are never questions about which adult is responsible for watching the child.

Safeguard Your Pool - Build layers of defense around the pool. Permanent foursided fencing that encloses the entire pool area should be four to six feet high and equipped with self-closing, self-latching gates.

Put Toys Away - Remove all toys from the pool when they are not in use. These colorful objects can be very attractive to little eyes. This also includes furniture and other objects in the pool area that children might use to climb over the fence.

Eliminate Distractions - The leading cause of distractions around the pool is an adult leaving to answer the phone, attend to something inside the home or helping someone else in or around the water. If you must leave, take the child/children with

Teach Water Safety - Learn and enforce all the water rules and, above all, teach by your example -- never swim alone, obey lifeguard warnings, refrain from running around pool decks, follow 'no diving' signs, and always wear a life jacket when boating, fishing or playing in or near deep or fast-moving water.

Floatation Device Dangers - Flotation devices such as armbands, floatation rings and inflatable toys give parents and children a false sense of security. These devices can shift suddenly, deflate or slip from underneath, leaving a child in a very dangerous situation.

Self-Rescue Swimming Lessons - Do your research in selecting an effective swimming program. Choose a program that will teach your child the skills to survive in the water. Self-Rescue skills are vital for infants and young children if they were to end up in the water alone. Instructors should have current CPR and first aid certification. Confirm that the instructor is certified to teach survival swimming

Spring is here; and so are kittens!

Please do not think I hate spring. However, spring brings out all of the new kittens. I love kittens; I just know that there will be too many. If there are too many, then not all of them will get adopted or sent to rescue. That is the part I don't like about spring.

Please keep in mind there is no such thing as an outdoor cat or an indoor/outdoor cat in Dayton. Unless you can contain your cat to your yard, then your cat can not go out. This is a safety issue for your cat. It is a neighborly and considerate thing and it is a violation and the cat can be impounded and/or you could receive a citation. I can pull up to a house and smell if they have roaming cats in the area. Many poor residents have piles of stool in their yards and they are not even pet owners. Think about it. Your cat is going to keep its area clean, so it will go to another yard to eliminate. It is unsanitary and just down right rude. If you choose to have a pet keep it in and clean up after it. It is not the neighborhood's responsibility.

I am currently trapping in the Dayton/Bellevue area. I am scrambling to get cats prior to kitten season. It is in-humane for these kittens to be born on the streets, under houses, in back yards, window sills etc. Spay/neuter is so economical right now with the OAR neuter scooter/Friends of the shelter and Wags and Whiskers vouchers, you can get your cats done for just \$10. That number is 513-871-0185.

You should also consider micro chipping your cat. If it does slip out we will be able to get your cat back to you (with a citation paid of course!). If your cat is micro chipped, make sure the information on the chip is up to date. If you would like to help with our mission of cleaning up Dayton, we are accepting pull top cans of cat food. You can drop them off at the city building. With our mass trapping we are running out of food fast. Tuna, sardines and salmon work also. Please call 859-292-3622 if you need assistance. You may need tips to make your cat happy indoors.

The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) has a lot of great tips on their website. If you have a cat problem in your neighborhood please call. If you are missing a cat please call the Campbell County Animal Shelter 859-635-2819. Let's all work together to make this year better for cat owning residents, as well as the non cat owning residents.

Play Ball! Dayton's Long History in Baseball

The crack of a bat, the smell of a well-oiled glove, an upturned collar and double layers of socks inside cleats on a blustery day, all signal the beginning of baseball season. Dayton has upheld the tradition from as early as 1859 with a team known as the Eagles Club team. From the time before the Civil War to present day Dayton, local restaurants and taverns, banks and grocery stores have sponsored teams. Whether it is youth or adult leagues, the favorite pastime had been baseball.

The Eagle Club Team has been written about in a book documenting the development of the sport. A member of the 1866 team stated to the Cincinnati Times that it was "the first team of its kind in the West." The book - <u>Baseball Pioneers</u>. 1850 – 1870: the Clubs and Players Who Spread the Sport Nationwide identifies the team as coming from Brooklyn, and tells of the town bordering Jamestown. By 1861 several players put down their bats and joined Company H, 15th Kentucky Infantry of the Union Army. Some reports tell of the Kentucky Infantry's involvement with Sherman's March and others suggest they served garrison duty and guarded the railroads. By 1865, the war over, men such as David Bricker, Michael Kennedy and James Mahaffey returned to Dayton to work as ship carpenters and caulkers. They were joined by Henry Pudder, a riverboat pilot who brought Allegheny, Pennsylvania baseball expertise to his pitching game in what soon would be known as Dayton. They took up their bats and challenged the Live Oaks Club of Cincinnati to cross the river and come to Brooklyn for a friendly game of baseball on September 8, 1866.

It must have been a pleasant day. You know the kind, when the grass is a sweet color of green, the sky astounds with big puffy clouds, and calliope music carries on a gentle breeze from the river. Imagine women with parasols, children playing tag, and men lounging on picnic blankets in the late summer afternoon sun. By 1866 the towns of Brooklyn and Jamestown were working together to form the city of Dayton, which would be incorporated the following year. But on that day in September, Brooklyn took pride in the challenge of a game. The Live Oaks team had been warned that the Eagles were a team of "rolling mill toughs," and "a stout, hardy set of men." They feared mostly the reputation of James Mahaffey who had been described as "a strong hitter." At his first two times at bat that day, James, with an eighteen inch bat in one hand, hit long fly balls over the schoolhouse. But even with such a strong hitter, the Eagles team could not bring home a win. They lost the challenge for Northern Kentucky to reign supreme in the realm of baseball, with a devastating loss of 52 to 41.

When you come through town today you might notice a new display has gone up in the window of the old Rifkin's Shoe Store at Sixth and McKinney. Three old time baseball cards have been enlarged for public view, and beside them are the stats for the first two professional ball players from Dayton, Jesse and Lee Tannehill, along with Todd Benzinger. Jesse started his professional career in 1893 as a Cincinnati Red. His career was less than stellar with the Reds, but he went on to play at Pittsburg and Boston where he led the National league in ERA at 2.18 in 1901 and then improved that average in 1902 to 1.95. In 1904, Jesse left his mark on baseball, pitching a no-hitter to the Chicago White Sox on August 17, 1904. During the game his brother Lee came to bat only to go 0 for 3. The Boston Red Sox went on to become the championship team that year. Jesse left Boston after that over a salary dispute and went on to play for the Highlanders of New York, a team that would later become the Yankees. He retired in 1911 only to reemerge in 1920 to coach the Philadelphia Phillies. After only one year as coach he returned to Dayton and worked in a Cincinnati Machine shop. They say that Jesse could be found on sunny afternoons at Crosley Field for many years. He died of a stroke at Speer's Hospital in 1956.

I can't help but feel some sadness for Lee Tannehill, Jesse's younger brother by six years. Perhaps Lee never escaped the long shadow of an older brother who excelled at baseball. Lee entered professional ball playing for the Chicago White Sox in 1903. While the White Sox were known as the "Hitless Wonders," Lee is credited with being the first White Sox player to hit a home run at Comiskey Park in Chicago. His other claim to fame was two unassisted double plays in the same game. The rest of his ten years as a professional baseball player were spent in Chicago as a member of the White Sox. His career is described as mediocre. He retired in 1912 and moved to Live Oak, Florida, dying in 1938.

Club baseball continued to grow in the early 1900's. The Eagles, the G.A.R., along with church leagues cropped up. In the Advertiser-Courier from April 13, 1961 a picture of the 1911 Champions of the Kentucky C.O.F. League posed for a picture. Twelve men with collars upturned surrounded a trophy, two bats, a catcher's mitt and face mask. Names of players include: Schlueter, Prigge, Schuh, Rose, Nieberding. They are proud men, the looks on their faces tell the story of the banner behind them: Champions. Perhaps they stood a little taller when they returned to jobs on a rope walk, or in the local butchers shop. In the 1930's the F & N Tavern sponsored a youth baseball team. Fourteen boys showed up for practice in the hopes of getting one of the nine starting positions. The Fuchs boys: Carl, Jack and Donuts all played on that team. Charlie Thiel who later became the town dentist threw the ball with Wally Connett, who would grow up to own Southern Foods Catering service and have the best Bar-B-Q in town. Gene Thomas, Sponnie Schue, Harry Feltman, Ray Torrey, Joe Kobbits, the Kuhlman boys: Bob and Tom, Len Nadicksberand, and Otto Heeg all played that summer in the early thirties. I imagine them riding the old time fire truck that Mr. Thomas kept shiny and clean in the parking lot across from the F & N. Did he give them a hamburger if they brought home a win?

On porches all over Dayton, as lightening bugs lit the night sky, the sound of the WLW radio announcers for the Reds could be heard the year Todd Benzinger was born in Speer's Hospital. It was 1963. Kids rode their bikes to St. Bernard's ball field, or Walker Field. They put baseball cards in the spokes of their wheels to sound the charge, gathering whatever able bodies were available for a game of 6 or 9 innings, however many they could get in before their mothers hollered for them to come home. Knothole, softball, and youth baseball had become past of the fiber of Dayton. Each spring, gloves and hats were donned and boys dreamed of the major leagues. Todd Benzinger didn't stay long in Dayton. His high school career at New Richmond showed off his talent as a first baseman before he signed with the Boston Red Sox. Todd played on the Cincinnati Reds World Series team of 1990 when the Reds swept the Oakland A's. After baseball, he came to settle once more in the Ohio Valley. He coached the Dayton Dragons in 2009 and 2010.

Dayton High School has had a baseball team for many years. The team's history has been eclipsed by the pride we take in knowing that John Wooden began his coaching career in Dayton, in 1933. However, the baseball team of 1994 has left its mark, but not on the field. Those young men have gone on to places like Yale and have become strong members of their individual communities, wherever they landed.

On Tuesday, April 2nd I happened to pass the Gil Lynn Park where a high school baseball game was in progress. Across Berry Street a man sat in his lawn chair watching the game from his front yard. The crowd cheered when the home team got a hit. I was reminded of our baseball heritage. When the Reds are playing and they get a homerun or win the game, there are placed in Dayton Kentucky where you can hear the fireworks echo up the river valley. From the earliest days, we learned team play. The ball players on the field Tuesday are no different, hustling from base to base, spreading spirit for the town they call home.



The Tharp Dayton Heritage Museum is located in Dayton, Kentucky along a beautiful bend in the Ohio River. It has been a point of reference since before the Revolutionary War. The museum's name commemorates Charlie Tharp, a local business man and historian. Through Charlie's efforts, during his 52 years in business in Dayton, we are fortunate to have a vast archive of Dayton history, dating back to the first settlers in 1779. Our mission is to preserve and exhibit the rich history of Dayton. Our goal is to tell the stories of the various aspects of life along this river town.

The sandbar at the bend in the Ohio witnessed a battle in 1779 between frontiersmen and members of a local Shoshone tribe. After that battle, the land became the farm of Thomas Berry in 1796 with the purchase of 1000 acres. From the farm grew 2 settlements-Jamestown and Brooklyn in the early 1800's. Dayton is the product of Brooklyn and Jamestown merging, and became an incorporated town in 1867. We honor this history and exhibit it for the benefit of the larger community.



Fireman Joe says...

You know, I honestly thought spring was finally here until this morning when I got to the firehouse. Temperatures were in the twenties and talk of snow for tomorrow fills the news. "Hey Mother Nature, enough is enough can we please have some spring?"

Well folks, look at it this way, we are finally into April and Easter is right around the corner, so even one day of cold or snow is not going to last very long, so have faith. Of course with spring comes spring cleaning, and spring storms which often brings unexpected severe weather conditions. So I want you to remember the difference between a Watch and a Warning.

If you hear we are under a severe storm watch or a tornado watch, that means there's an elevated risk of a tornado or a severe storm but the location is uncertain, so start preparing for a storm.


A severe storm warning or tornado warning means a tornado funnel or severe storm was sighted or indicated by weather radar in the immediate area, TAKE SHELTER IMMEDIATELY. No place outdoors is safe in a thunderstorm, which can serve up a dangerous mix of lightning, hail and tornadoes.

Some things to do... If you hear thunder, find a safe place indoors, secure windows and doors, then move away from them. Turn off and unplug electronics, stay indoors for 30 minutes after the last lightning or thunder.

I strongly suggest kick off your planning by creating or purchasing an emergency kit packed with these items: bottled water, nonperishable foods, battery operated AM/FM radio and or NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert, blankets and extra clothing, First Aid Kit, prescriptions and medicines for all family members, hygiene items, flashlights with extra batteries, cell phone, cash and or credit card and don't forget some food for the pets.


