AN ORDINANCE ACCEPTING THE BID OF MCIMETRO FOR A TWENTY YEAR NON-EXCLUSIVE FRANCHISE FOR THE USE OF THE PUBLIC STREETS, ALLEYS AND OTHER PUBLIC GROUNDS OF THE CITY TRANSMISSION FOR THE AND DISTRIBUTION OF COMMUNICATION THROUGH SERVICES AND FOR CONSUMPTION WITHIN THE CITY.

WHEREAS, MCImetro is a public utility providing communications services in Kentucky subject to the provisions of Sections 163 and 164 of the Kentucky Constitution and K.R.S. 96.010 through 96.045; and

WHEREAS, Section 163 of the Kentucky Constitution prohibits public utilities from using the streets, alleys and other public grounds within a city without a franchise for that use; and

WHEREAS, MCImetro and the City desire to enter into a franchise agreement under which MCImetro may access and use the streets, alleys, and public grounds of the City for the provision of communications services within the City; and

WHEREAS, the City enacted Ordinance 2018-#3 to establish a franchise for the provision of communications services within the City (the "**Ordinance**") and has published notice of said Ordinance in accordance with Kentucky law; and

WHEREAS, MCIMetro submitted a bid for the provision of communications services within the City; and

WHEREAS, the City has determined that MCImetro's bid satisfied the requirements of the Ordinance and accepted said bid by an affirmative vote that also authorized and directed the Mayor to enter into this Agreement with MCImetro.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF DAYTON, CAMPBELL COUNTY, KENTUCKY AS FOLLOWS:

Section I – Acceptance of Bid

The attached bid or franchise agreement from MCImetro satisfies the requirements of Ordinance 2018#3 and hereby accepted as tendered.

Section II - Grant of Franchise

Pursuant to City of Dayton Ordinance 2018#3, MCImetro is hereby granted a non-exclusive twenty (20) year franchise for the use of the City streets, alleys and public grounds for the transmission and distribution of communication services through and for consumption within the City.

Section III - Provisions Severalable

The provisions of this ordinance are severable; and the invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision thereof; and such other provisions shall remain in full force and effect as long as they remain valid in the absence of those provisions determined to be invalid.

Section IV – Conflicting Ordinances Repealed

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section V - Effective Date and Publication

This Ordinance shall be signed by the Mayor, attested by the City Clerk, recorded, and shall be in effect at the earliest time provided by law after publication in summary pursuant to KRS 83A.060(9).

City Administrator's Report:

Request for a handicap parking sign from Gary Volkering, 823 Sixth Avenue. Mr. Volkering meets all the requirements. Motion by Member Cornett, seconded by Member Burns to approve the handicap parking space. Motion carried—so ordered.

The City received three bids for banking service. At this point the City will stay with our current bank since we have a very favorable interest rate which is more than double of what we were offered by any other bank. We are aware that our current bank is merging.

Money was paid from the General Fund for road repair/sidewalks curbs. This was for the Seventh Avenue Curb, new catch basin, and grates. City Adm. Giffen asked approval to repay the General Fund from the Municipal Aid Fund in the amount of \$2,475.05. Motion by Member Neary, seconded by Member Volter to reimburse the General Fund for these expenses. Comments: Member Burns would like to see a better solution on Seventh Avenue. The blacktop curb will be destroyed. City Adm. Giffen said this was done because emergency vehicles can go over blacktop better than they can go over concrete. Member Burns said the blacktop will break. Motion carried—so ordered.

Bluegrass Paving will be back soon to finish the work they did not complete last year.

Department Head's Report:

Chris Adkins, Fire Chief, submitted a copy of his report. The Fire Board meeting is tomorrow night at 6:00 p.m.

David Halfhill, Police Chief, submitted a copy of his report.

Bob Yoder, Economic Development Director, submitted his report.

Main Street:

We are progressing on plans for a monthly flea market in the City Parking Lot, 600 block of Sixth Avenue. More to announce at the May council meeting.

The Main Street Board will be taking over the Taste of Dayton this fall. The next Main Street Meeting is Tuesday, April 30, 7:00 p.m. at the old YMCA building.

CCAP:

I'll be sending you a report on the CCAP Expenditures for the 3rd Quarter of FY2018-2019.

This has been the most successful year to date of the program. The Ribbon Cutting for Avenue Pharmacy was a success, and the renovation of that building is amazing.

Grants:

Dayton KY 8/TANK Route 12 Improvement Project. This grant was submitted 18 months ago.

Governor Bevin has committed to allocate \$123,594 from the federal Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP). This is the Dayton Kentucky Tank Route improvement project. At the turn-around end of Clark Street we'll be putting a concrete pad and bus shelter for those who use the bus service in the Industrial Park. More benches, and trash cans will also be added. At Sixth & O'Fallon and Sixth & Clay we'll be adding receptacles for cigarette butts, benches, and six more light poles. This grant will upgrade the services for those who take public transportation in Dayton.

Still working on the Sixth Avenue TAP and Dayton Pike SRTS Project. Still waiting on approval for our Right of Way plan from the State. I contact them weekly.

CY2019 TAP Grant:

Submitting application to connect the sidewalk along Dayton Pike from Chateau Ridge to the end of the City of Fort Thomas's Sidewalk Project at North Ridge Lane. The City of Ft. Thomas is coming down to North Ridge Lane with a sidewalk.

CY2019 Recreational Trails Grant/Land and Water Conservation Grant Submitting application to improve and create recreational trails in Sargeant Park.

Crumb Rubber Grant: Benches and Picnic Table for Clark St. Park and Jamestown Park

There will be a Board of Architectural Review meeting on May 14, 7:00 p.m. at Bucks BBQ. Check the Dayton Community News for Articles on Historic Preservation.

Member Neary said this month is Pedestrian Safety Month and he would like to get prices on pedestrian crossing solar flashing lights. Mr. Yoder will bring back a cost to council.

Phil Liles, Director of Codes, submitted a copy of his report. There were sixty letters issued for the month of March. Of those, thirteen were citations and forty violations. Thirty-two cases were closed in March. Member Cornett thanked Mr. Liles for the reminder he put in the Community News. Member Volter told Mr. Liles to keep up the good work.

Member Burns thanked Donna Leger, Clerk/Treas., for the outstanding job she does on the audit, and the monthly financial reports she sends to council. This budget is what runs this City.

Unfinished Business:

Member Neary would like a timeline for the New City Building. The city spent \$35,000 for KZF to do an estimated cost for a New City Building. Can we put a copy of the KZF report on the city web page? Member Neary would like to hold a public meeting on Tuesday, May 21st, and have KZF Design present their plans for a New City Building behind the Monument. City Adm. Giffen

will contact KZF Design, but if the city is looking at a second option the two options need to be compared side by side so the public knows what's at stake. I can't put together a reasonable cost analysist until I have all the information. There is a lot of unknowns. If KZF presents on May 21 and we wait 6 to 12 months for the second option, what KZF presents is irrelevant. City Adm. Giffen would like direction on where this is going. If we're going to pursue a second option we need to do that, and then present these options side by side. Member Lynn noted, we've been waiting for the other option since Feb. and it's not back. We own this land. We've been working on this site for 10-15 years in order to build a City Building. I agree with other options, but this is not working out because they (option 2) won't get back with the city. Mayor Baker noted there was a meeting today to discuss cost with option 2. We've had other meetings with option 2 over the last two months. Member Cornett questioned whether or not this would be a viable option. The City has already spent \$547,000 to get the land behind the monument ready, and Member Cornett is not willing to spend any more money. Mayor Baker said a new study would be a fraction of that cost because we've already done a lot of the work in the first study. City Adm. Giffen noted there are steps we'll need to take if we go through another agency. It will cost money. I don't think it's fair to KZF, or the city to present something that immediately, or 6 months to a year be tossed out the window. This has already been delayed a year. I need some direction soon. We can't keep this hanging over us budget wise. Member Lynn suggested putting information into an e-mail to council, as he had no idea the Administration was meeting with someone from the second option. Member Lynn is not in favor of the second option. Mayor Baker asked City Adm. Giffen to keep council informed of these meetings. City Adm. Member Cornett said council can make the decision on when to start. Member Volter would like this to be an informational meeting for the public. A presentation of the study we had done for a new city building. It's not about making a decision, it's about getting the information out to our citizens. Member Burns noted Police Officers are working in unsafe conditions. We have a problems in the Police Department, and we can't keep putting this off. City Adm. Giffen said the facilities we now have are inadequate. Member Beseler said as time goes on you'll see we don't have enough money to spend this amount for a single project. Member Lynn said we can't keep spending money on options. Motion by Member Lynn, seconded by Member Neary to have KZF present their presentation for a New City Building at a public meeting on May 21st.

Motion by Member Lynn, seconded by Member Burns to look at option 1,Berry Street and look at option 2, the one in current discussion, and do not have any further options available for a city building. Comments: Member Neary felt this will limit our options. Member Lynn said we can talk about this for the next 6 years and the only thing we're really doing is wasting time and money. By that time the City Building will cost three times as much. We can't just keep spending money on all these options.

Member Cornett asked if the Storm Water Task Force has a solution for the Tom Dilts issue. City Adm. Giffen noted the area will be dye-tested the next time we have a heavy rain. Member Volter will also be checking on a run-off situation at Sixth & Benham St. Member Burns would like the Task Force to check Fairview also.

Member Neary suggested the Park Board be involved in Sargeant Park. City Adm. Giffen said the Park Board recently met.

Member Burns asked why the floodgate is still up. City Adm. Giffen reported Public Works is short staffed, it will be down shortly.

New Business:

Prus Construction has started the first phase of the Riverfront Commons project. Hopefully by the end of the summer we'll have the first phase of the trail open.

Executive Session:

Mayor Baker entertained a motion to go into executive session to discuss KRS 61.810 (b) Deliberations on the future acquisition or sale of real property by a public agency, but only when publicity would be likely to affect the value of a specific piece of property to be acquired for public use or sold by a public agency. This is in reference to property located at 118 Sixth Avenue. Motion by Member Neary, seconded by Member Volter to go into executive session. Motion carried—so ordered.

Motion by Member Volter, seconded by Member Cornett to go back into regular session. Motion carried—so ordered.

Motion by Member Volter, seconded by Member Lynn for City Att. Edge, City Adm. Giffen, and Mayor Baker to proceed with negotiations and bring back legal documents to council, to be finalized.
